The text of the final ruling appended to the minutes of the hearing follows. This final ruling constitutes a "reasoned explanation" for the court's decision and accordingly is posted 15 to the court's Internet site, <u>www.caeb.uscourts.gov</u>, in a text-searchable format as required by the E-Government Act of 2002. 16 The official record of this ruling remains the minutes of the 17 hearing. 18 FINAL RULING 19 The objection will be overruled. 20 The debtors listed a claim held by the Yolo County Tax 21 Collector in the amount of \$25,328.97 in their Schedule D. 22 debtors now object to the scheduled claim. They declare that the 23 claim was paid in full. 24 To be paid, a claim must be filed. See 11 U.S.C. §§ 501, 25 502; Fed. R. Bankr. P. 3003. Here, the claim was deemed filed 26 because it was scheduled by the debtors. See 11 U.S.C. § 27 1111(a). Claims that are filed, or that are deemed filed, are

allowed unless objected to by a party in interest. Allowed

claims are then paid.

If a debt is paid before the petition was filed, the claim filed or deemed filed for that debt is properly disallowed because nothing was owed on the date the petition was filed.

Claims are determined as of the petition date.

If the payment occurred after the petition was filed, it makes no sense to sustain the objection. Disallowing a claim means that the claim holder is not entitled to payment.

Allowance means that it is entitled to payment. Here, if the claim is disallowed, the claimant would be required to return the payment. Yet, the basis for the objection is that the claim was paid. The objection is a non sequitur.

The evidence does not indicate when the claim was paid. At the hearing, however, counsel for the debtors conceded the payment came after the petition was filed. Therefore, the objection must be overruled and the claim allowed.
